SPA U12 Boys

There was a panel of 22 in the Spa U12 boys (20 out of the 22 boys were under 11). The panel commenced indoor training in January 2016 facilitated by Donal O'Doherty which provided us with a varied skills training programme.

We were placed in division 6 in phase 1 of the county league. In this division we faced Ballyheigue, Duagh, Currow, Finuge and Rathmore. Unfortunately our young panel faced very strong opposition in this division, however as this competition progressed Spa ran a strong Finuge side to two points in the final match of phase 1 of the county league.

Due to our performance in phase 1 of the county league, the team were placed in division 8 in phase 2 of the county league. Spa faced Gneeveguilla, Ballylongford / Asdee, St Patricks Blennerville, Castleisland Desmonds and Kilcummin. Spa comprehensively won all their matches in phase 2 of the county league barring a narrow defeat against Gneeveguilla on a night when Spa were missing some key experienced players.

The team also played a number of challenge matches over the season including a good win over Macroom in the Castle Grounds and a competitive encounter with Galtee Rovers on the morning of the Munster Senior Football Final in Killarney.

The team were also invited to play in the Gerry Foley Invitational Blitz in Firies where the boys played brilliantly narrowly beaten by Rathmore and Kilcummin in the first two games followed by a good win over Legion in the final game.

Spa played in the East Kerry league where we had good results against Templenoe and Firies and narrowly beaten by Beaufort, Currow and Rathmore. At this stage of the season the coaching team could see a vast improvement in the team's skill level and confidence.

In October, the U12 Management team hosted a quiz and medal presentation ceremony for the parents and boys involved in the U12 panel during 2016. Dara Moynihan presented medals to the boys on the night. Money raised on the night went towards new footballs, training bibs, cones and various other training aids for 2017.

Plenty "Hop Balls" at Special Coiste na nOg fundraising event

Over 250 people were in attendance at the Torc Hotel, on Friday 11th Nov 2016, for a novel Spa GAA Coiste Na nOg Club fundraiser, Hop Ball. All present enjoyed a fabulously entertaining night.

Proceedings got underway in a lively fashion, with former Kerry great Dara Ó'Cinnéide, an experienced presenter of Raidio na Gaeltachta and TV sports programmes, acting as anchor for the night.

Dara chatted with the club minors of the last few years who played for Kerry – Liam Kearney, Dan O'Donoghue, Mike Foley and Evan Cronin. Dara Moynihan was unavailable on the night. Youth has no fear of honesty and the lads provided great entertainment in telling of their experiences since winning All-Ireland medals with schools and county. Dara mixed the humour with the serious and got great commentary from the lads on what club, school and county participation mean to them. There were interesting insights into injury risks faced by younger players, which all agreed was something that merited more analysis.

The minors were immediately followed by All-Ireland winning club members from the 1960's and 1970's. This interaction was incredibly honest, with all participating on topical issues. Dara Ó'Cinnéide expertly judged the insightfulness and depth of contributions of all present – Michael Gleeson, Donie O'Sullivan and Paudie O'Mahoney.

Michael Gleeson talked about the value of community in a GAA club and entertained all present with an anecdote on his brief rugby career when studying in Dublin. Paudie recounted his record of not conceding a goal in an All-Ireland campaign.

Dara raised the growing influence of the GPA (Gaelic Players' Association) in the game and Donie excellently responded with a well-considered argument about the privilege and the responsibility of being selected to play for your county and the risk that the existence of the GPA could lead to elitism within the playing GAA community of county versus club.

This provided plenty talking points for the final panel of Donnchadh Walsh and Darran O'Sullivan, of Kerry, and Brian Fenton and Ciaran Kilkenny, from Dublin.

Dara began with the final group by commenting to the Kerry lads about all the times Kerry people, including the players, used to graciously comment that it would be great to see Dublin win an All-Ireland. He asked if Donnchadh and Darran still felt this way.

Fenton and Kilkenny gave plenty of insights into playing on the Dublin team. Dara questioned all on the threat of Australian Rules football and the attraction it presents for young Gaelic footballers. Kilkenny recounted his experience of spending time in Australia playing Australian Rules professionally and how he decided quite quickly it wasn't for him.

He said the appeal of winning All-Irelands with Dublin and the prospect of success with his club proved too alluring. The floor was opened to Q&A and young and old alike had no shortage of questions and comments. All participants stayed around to meet everyone afterwards for photos and introductions.

Jim Gleeson, who acted as MC on the night, deserves special acknowledgement for the excellent introductions he gave all participants, which was well researched and excellently delivered.

The organising committee was led by Coiste na nOg Chairman Ivor Flynn and included Michael 'Stam'O'Donoghue, Andrew Garnett and Tadhg Hickey. The main sponsor of the night was Simply Suits while the Torc Hotel also provided outstanding support, as always.

Thanks to all who participated on the night and gave so freely and generously of their time for this fundraiser which raised over €4,000 for the underage club.

While attending a Child Protection meeting, in Killarney, around August 2015, reference was made to Kerry hosting Féile the following year. In order for our U14 boys and girls teams to participate, 24 Spa families had to agree to host 2 children in their homes for 2 nights, on 24th and 25th June 2016, and everyone over the age of 18 in those houses would need to be Garda vetted.

Right says I, better get cracking getting people to commit so that Anne Holland could get started on the vetting. A couple of meetings, many texts messages, letters and phone calls later, and it was obvious that there weren't enough host families for the girls.

As my own two girls were U14, it meant, they now wouldn't be competing in Féile. The boys fared slightly better, but we were still short of houses. It was decided to enter a team and the host situation would get sorted nearer the time. Summer 2016 came around quickly and additional club officers got on board with myself and Anne in forming a Féile committee.

Assumpta O'Donoghue stepped into the role of Féile Coordinator. Ivor Flynn agreed to take on the role of Coiste na nÓg Chairperson, a position that had remained vacant since January 2016, and Mathilda McCarthy juggled Spa shop duties with her new role on the committee. Things were coming along nicely. Adrian O'Sullivan joined me at the long awaited draw, where our visiting club was revealed as St. Mary's, Kiltoghert, Co. Leitrim. By the time I got home, the information was up on the Spa Facebook page. Parents were very enthusiastic about purchasing Féile tracksuits and the club kindly agreed to subsidise same for the occasion. On the night that the gear was being distributed, with only a week to go before Féile, we still didn't have enough host families. I can't stress enough the role the 11 families that did host the 23 boys (one family hosted 3 children) played in Féile.

Only for those families, the U14 boys wouldn't have been able to participate. A few of their own children lost their beds and, some even moved out that weekend to accommodate the Leitrim lads, so I know it wasn't easy.

Joining our visiting Leitrim team on Friday 24th June at Spa, were Gneeveguilla, and their visiting team, Shandonagh, Co. Westmeath. Great work was done by referee, Tom Moriarty, in managing the 4 games played that evening. While the games were being played, Pat O'Neill, Adrian O'Sullivan and John O'Donoghue were cooking up a storm on the balcony with the barbeque. A big bualadh bos to everyone who showed great community spirit in helping out that night.

Relentless determination and commitment bring success to young Spa stars at highest level

At the tender age of 12, Pakistani girl Malala Yousafzai began secretly blogging about the Taliban's punitive attempts to prevent young girls from accessing education. At just 14, she miraculously survived an assassination attempt after receiving a gunshot to the head.

Her relentless drive to secure and preserve young women's education was recognised when she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, in 2014, becoming the youngest person ever to achieve the award. She is a 'millennial' role model for all, a young person who has faced down adversity in the pursuit of justice and equality. She is inspirational.

In her Nobel Prize acceptance speech, she outlined the motive behind her bravery and defiance: "We had a thirst for an education, we had a thirst because our future was right there in that classroom. We would sit there with big dreams in our eyes. We wanted to make our parents proud and prove that we could excel."

We have been inspired, too, by many of the younger members of our community who have excelled in recent years. The

county has had a run of sustained success at underage level, especially since 2014 with 3 All-Ireland minor wins and Hogan Cup triumphs for St. Brendan's College, following on from Pobalscoil Chorca Dhuibhne's outstanding achievement.

Many of us have been privileged to witness the prominent role young Spa men have had in various successful All-Ireland campaigns of recent years.

2016 has got to go into the football annals as being one of most memorable years considering the outstanding success achieved by the young men of Kerry, East Kerry and St. Brendan's College.

Awarded man of the match in Kerry's All-Ireland victory over Galway after contributing 0-2 from play in a typically industrious performance which saw him at the heart of all of the team's crucial scores, Dara turned in a tremendous display on the most special stage – Croke Park on All-Ireland final day.

It was a performance that was not in isolation. Months earlier, this same insatiable hunger and relentless drive was so apparent in helping his school colleagues from 'the Sem' to a long-awaited Hogan Cup triumph.

With his team struggling to establish a foothold in the game, Dara's energy and willingness to scrap for possession was a lifeline. He was the heartbeat of a special team. These two performances in particular have shown that Croke Park is a stage that he savours and we hope there will be many more memorable moments there for Dara in the future.

Hogan Cup success is very special to St. Brendan's. There have been too many near misses over the years, but to finally reach the summit of colleges football is heartening for many who have helped advance the cause of 'the Sem' over the years.

Spa can be proud of the role that all four members of the panel had over this campaign. David Carroll, Evan Cronin and David Spillane joined Dara Moynihan in helping secure a third Hogan Cup for school, a first since 1992.

Spa man David Spillane had the honour of captaining East Kerry, who enjoyed victories over Shannon Rangers, Dr. Crokes and St. Brendan's en route to a county final victory in Fitzgerald Stadium, last October, over a well organised Mid-Kerry side, running out winners on a scoreline of 3-16 to 0-09.

Seamus Moynihan was delighted with the contribution of the five lads and praised them for their efforts during the campaign: "All of the players from Spa gave us a huge effort over the year. Dion Marcos selflessly travelled from college in Galway, showing great commitment. Niall McCarthy responded very well to training and his development over the year was obvious to us. We were without a number of players the evening that we played St. Brendan's and both David Spillane and Dara Moynihan really stepped up. There is undoubted potential and young talent in our ranks. It is a great hope that these past achievements will drive future senior success in the blue and gold of Spa. Like any triumph, it will take serious commitment and will not be easy.

It all started out simply enough when Sheila McCarthy was asked by her sister, Ann, to help out for one season of Scór. After fourteen years of service as Scór Officer, we

look back at what Sheila McCarthy has contributed to our club.

Sheila has been the most active Scór Officer in the county during this period and it is no coincidence that it has coincided with a period of unprecedented success in all levels of Scór for the club. A multitude of East Kerry, County, Munster and All-Ireland titles have come to the club during this period. Sheila, in her inimitable style, has been the glue that held it all together. Sheila has always had a tremendous interest in all activities related to the club. She is usually involved in any cultural or social activities organised by the club and a supporter of all Spa teams at venues throughout the county. Sheila believes passionately in the value of the GAA club in the community and its capacity to provide an outlet to members young and old.

Sheila in her role as Scór Officer meant business from the start. There were no half measures and her exceptional organisational skills were enthusiastically put into use for the benefit of the club. It was not unusual to find the invitation to Scór participants in the Spa notes from the end of August onwards. Most other clubs would start thinking about Scór in October!

Meetings were organised, mentors put in place and participants identified for the various disciplines. The season generally started with Scór na nOg in October and ended with Scór na bPaisti in April, with Scór Sinsear in between and overlapping with All-Ireland finals in the years we were fortunate to progress at Munster level.

Sheila's style and input were consistent throughout, whether a first round East Kerry competition in Fossa Hall or an All-Ireland Final in City West, Castlebar or Derry. Competitors were first and foremost representing Spa and had to be well prepared, well attired and ready to give of their best for Spa.

Winning was great but to Sheila only a bonus. Participation and making the experience as enjoyable as possible, particularly for the younger participants, was the main objective for Sheila. However, Sheila had high standards for herself and this rubbed off on mentors and participants. Without losing the sense of fun and enjoyment, unprecedented success followed.

Spa senior set dancers won a record-breaking five in a row All-Ireland titles in the period 2004 to 2008. The senior figure dancers won seven All-Irelands over the period 2002 to 2016. Spa was the first club in Ireland to win the All-Ireland in figure and set dancing in the same year; in 2004 initially and again in 2007.

It gave Sheila particular pleasure to make the breakthrough at All-Ireland level in Scór na nOg. We were successful in the rince set and recitation in 2014; the rince foirne and quiz in 2015 and again in the quiz in 2016. Sheila was a constant in all these unprecedented successes throughout the years.

Parents, mentors and participants were always kept in the loop; one stage of the competition was no sooner finished than Sheila was organising transport, accommodation and meals in venues throughout Ireland with her unrivalled efficiency. The best and most cost effective options were always provided and it made it easier for everyone involved.

While Spa as a club has always had a strong focus on cultural matters, Sheila, as a member of the Executive Committee for many years, kept the Scór activities to the forefront. It was a two-way street.

While Spa has always been known for its football process through the successful O'Donoghue Cup teams, Donie O'Sullivan and Mick Gleeson its first Kerry players, right through to our outstanding Kerry minor representatives of recent years, it is also synonymous with Scór at a local and national level.

While Sheila, with usual modesty, would acknowledge the contribution and expertise of participants and mentors, there is no question but she has been the leader, organiser and motivator for so many of the Spa successes.

Sheila McCarthy has given tremendous service to Spa in many roles, but we will look back in times to come in awe at what was achieved during her time as Scór Officer.

We all felt enriched that we had known colleagues like Mick Kissane, Mickey Cronin, Paddy Dennehy, Timmy Joe O'Sullivan, John "Dunn" O'Donoghue, Denis Fenton, John Joe Foley, Tadhg O'Sullivan, Con Doherty, Mick Fitzgerald and Donie O'Leary.

Seán Moynihan, who travelled from Derry for the night, did the readings. The veterans of 1966 greatly appreciated being honoured by the club in such a dignified way. Their one fervent wish was that the O'Donoghue Cup, for too long now a stranger, would once again become a regular visitor to the beautiful club facilities in Tullig. The night showed the GAA at its best — interacting with the local community while remembering deceased colleagues and honouring their relatives. We hope that increasing commercialism in the higher echelons will not further weaken these core values of the GAA.

Croke Park Lauds Spa GAA '31' Championship of Kerry

Forty-five long years have elapsed since the Spa '31' Championship of Kerry was initiated. Over the decades, it has proved to be a valuable fundraiser for the club and a social outlet for the members, not to mention the many fine card players who have graced its tables.

In an earlier era, it was organised as a weekly card game followed by a dance in the Ryan Hotel (now Hotel Killarney) and later the Castle Heights (now Killarney Heights Hotel). It attracted card players and set dancers from all over the county each week and continued for several decades.

However, with the passing of time and the retirement and passing of so many card players, interest gradually waned. By the late 1990's, the club officers decided the time had arrived to review that format.

A committee comprising John Wickham as chairman, Johnny Cronin and Dave Herlihy, later augmented by Paddy O'Keeffe and Paddy B Lynch, whose father, Patrick Lynch, was a regular supporter of the weekly card drive.

The brief of the newly-elected committee was to review the format and replace it with a system whereby cards would be distributed to various venues around the county including Reenard to Valentia, Waterville and Dromid, and to Kenmare, Kilgarvan, Rathmore and Kilcummin and various other venues around east Kerry where the game of '31' was popular.

The committee has done trojan work and has enhanced the image of the competition. When the former President of Ireland, Mary McAleese and her husband, Martin, launched the GAA Social Initiative, in 2009, with a view to creating more inclusiveness in local communities, particularly among older age groups, the Spa '31' Championship of Kerry received due recognition in Croke Park.

The Muckross sportsman who became a loyal servant to Spa GAA club

Since the formation of Spa GAA club in 1948, many outstanding footballers and athletes from the Muckross area have made a major contribution to the club, as well as to Spa--Muckross Community Games and athletic clubs. Today, the Spa-Muckross link continues to grow.

When Spa won the senior East Kerry title in 1949, the team included the Mulligan brothers, James and Patrick, Timmy Looney, Jim Walsh, Patrick Fleming and Jim Galvin. During the intervening 70 years, many more fine footballers and athletes from the area have

donned the blue and gold with distinction, none greater than Pat Casey, from Gortagullane, who made a noble contribution to the club over a 24-year period.

Pat's first introduction to competitive football was with Naomh Mhuire in the national schools' competition, forerunner to East Kerry Bord na nOg, and he also assisted Moyeightragh in the Town Leagues before joining the reformed Spa GAA club in 1962.

A year later, he was a member of the Spa/Glenflesk minor side which won the East Kerry minor league and his colleagues in that team included Mick Gleeson, Johnny Cronin, Brian Fenton, Denny Doolan, Jack Morris (Spa) as well as Derry Crowley, Pat Favier, Paddy and Ger O'Donoghue (Glenflesk).

As Spa did not have a senior team, Pat and many of the aforementioned members of the Spa side which won the EK minor league, in 1963, joined the St Finan's senior club, which was then competing in the senior East Kerry championship for the 0'Donoghue Cup, and figured in the half-back line with the hospital side defeated in the 1964 0'Donoghue Cup final by Dr Crokes.

When St Finan's became defunct in 1965, a decision was taken by Spa to affiliate for the East Kerry senior championship in 1966 and, as happened away back in 1948, this side emerged victorious over Kilcummin in the final. Pat Casey turned in a masterly display at midfield against Kerry senior player Tim Sheahan, a display which made him an automatic choice for the East Kerry senior team which won four senior county championship titles and the inaugural All-Ireland club championship, 1965 to '71.

He continued to assist Spa to further 0'Donoghue Cup victories in 1969, '7I, '72, '74, '75 and '77, as well as senior county league and county intermediate championship titles in 1974 and '75

His displays in those games gained him recognition by the Kerry senior selection committee and he was a member of the Kerry senior panel which defeated Dublin in the 1975 All-Ireland final.

Indeed, he would surely have retained his place on the Kerry panel but for the fact that he joined the Merchant Navy for

some years, returning during the summer months to assist Spa. He also helped Spa to win an East Kerry hurling title in 1985.

Pat also distinguished himself as an oarsman with the Muckross RC and helped the club to win the senior sixes title at Killarney Regatta in 1973.

During his school days, he was a noted athlete and won many prizes at the annual Loreto national schools' sports day. At one event, he helped Loughquittane NS win the trophy for the best overall school in the county.

Suffice it to state the entire Casey family has enjoyed much success in the sporting arena, with Pat's wife, Breda (nee Kissane), winning numerous races with both St Finan's and Muckross rowing clubs at Killarney regatta.

Family members Padraig, Sean and Denise have carried on the rowing tradition, with Sean representing Ireland in rowing at the Olympic Games.

Denise, now married into another famous sporting family, the Coffeys from Muckross, is deeply immersed in all aspects of Muckross RC and has also figured on many of the club's winning crews in recent years

Spa GAA club are indeed indebted to Pat Casey and the extended Casey family for their contribution to sport, including Gaelic football, over so many decades.

The term, 'legend', is very often bestowed on the great players of a club, and Spa has a long list of names worthy of the title. One of the self-effacing men in the background who would never describe himself as such is Patsy Cremin.

Too bad, Patsy. All of them would, and so would many others. Patsy was the driving force behind the development of Bord (now Coiste) na nÓg, not just in Spa but far beyond.

Juvenile GAA relied almost entirely on the schools and occasional club tournaments and challenge games up to the early '60s. Coaching was almost unheard of. Kerry had great footballers, but we relied very heavily on tradition and happenstance to develop their skills.

Some people, among them Patsy Cremin, had another idea. It was Ger McKenna, now President of Kerry GAA, who first proposed at the 1966 County Convention, that a Committee be set up. County Chairman, Dr. Jim Brosnan, agreed and drafted in the great Johnny Walsh, of Ballylongford, to set it up.

April 1967, almost exactly a half century ago. Tralee's CYMS Hall (the Austin Stack Pavilion, like the idea of a County League, were first mooted by Dr. Brosnan the same year). Dr. Jim Brosnan, Kerry Secretary Tadhg Crowley, Johnny Brosnan (Chairman), Vice Chairman Fr. James Linnane, Declan Horgan (secretary), Br. Clancy (treasurer) and more people to represent the clubs and areas.

No full list of attendees survives, but certainly two men present were Tadhg O'Sullivan (for East Kerry) and Patsy Cremin (Spa). Patsy was well-known as a gateman for East Kerry and his work with the Fitzgerald Stadium Committee, as well as his work for Spa.

Patsy has remained involved ever since, serving on the Kerry Bórd na nÓg Executive Committee all along while always sowing good crops among Spa's juveniles — crops that have yielded many a rich harvest down through the years! Patsy is now President of Coiste na nÓg Chiarraí.

Patsy has coached (and occasionally cajoled and coaxed) many a Spa juvenile team since then. Spa, and Kerry, are immeasurably richer for his unstinting contribution of time, expertise, and patience.

Many of his proteges have worn the green and gold as well as the blue and gold. One in particular was a special moment for Patsy when his son, Denis, led out the Kerry minors as captain in 1982 (the same year that Féile Peil was founded). Denis was corner back and his clubmate Mike McAuliffe was corner forward (Glenflesk's Davy O'Donoghue would be another familiar name), but unfortunately Kerry lost out to Dublin by 1-11 to 1-5 in the final, with Mike kicking 1-3.

In 2015 and 2016, Patsy's grandson, Mike Breen, won two minor All Irelands with Kerry and his sister, Tara, has won two U16 All Irelands with Kerry.

Patsy has never once looked for recognition for all that he has done for Spa and for children all over Kerry, but he was honoured in 1995 with the GAA Communications Award for services to Bord na nÓg at Local, Divisional and County levels. The Award was presented by Sean Kelly, then Chairman of Kerry County Board.

Patsy was also the popular inductee of the East Kerry Hall of Fame in 2015.

No-one has deserved it more.

James Cahill The Complete Clubman



As a good friend of James, it is indeed an honour for me to pen these few words in appreciation of his enormous contribution to the club, both on and off the field, over the last 40 odd years. Born in Knocknahoe in 1961, as a young boy he attended Raheen national school and even there was impressing everyone with his football skills. One evening in 1971 at the tender age of ten, James ventured to the famed O'Keeffe's field to watch some underage training under the very astute Timmy Joe O'Sullivan, or Thado as he was affectionately known. Later that evening he was told "bring your boots the next night and you can stand in goal".

That started a fifteen-year relationship with the great Thado as his team trainer and mentor and, most of all, they also became great friends. Quotes are from the Spa GAA club publication, "50 Blian Ag Fás", published in 1998, and from James' own tribute to Thado, R.I.P., 1986. There are transport memories always of that beloved grey Escort, NIN 447.

James went on to play at all underage levels, winning his first county medal at U16 in 1974 when only 13 years of age. His secondary education took him to St. Brendan's College and afterwards to the Dublin Institute of Technology where he qualified in June 1985.

He started work that October as Environmental Health Officer in Limerick with the Mid Western Health Board, (now the HSE West) and is now based in Newcastlewest. During those years, James played at minor and U21 levels and made his senior debut in 1980 at right full back, winning Kerryman Shield honours that year — a very successful start to his senior career which was to span the next 23 years as an outstanding defender at both senior and junior level.

He won three O'Donoghue Cup medals in 1985, 1987 and 1989 and had the honour of being captain in 1987.

In 1987, Killarney again had a good run, with victories over Shannon Rangers and Feale Rangers before going down to eventual champions Kenmare by one point in the semi-final, 1-8 to 1-7. Paudie O'Mahoney, former Kerry goalkeeper and Spa trainer during those years, described James as "the best leader I ever witnessed in a dressing room". Great praise indeed.

As his senior career was coming to an end in the early nineties, Later that year, he was called into the Kerry senior team for

the National League campaign and had some memorable performances in the green and gold under the watchful eye of the supremo himself Mick O Dwyer who was the bainisteoir at the time.

In 1986, Spa and Legion amalgamated as Killarney for the senior county championship and James played a starring role at left full back, having some memorable performance over West Kerry, Desmond's and Dr Crokes before going down to a star-studded Austin Stacks in the final.

James went on to play a major role in the junior team for many

years winning the County Urban League in 1996, O'Sullivan Cup East Kerry in 1994 and did

the double in East Kerry in 1997, winning the Junior League and Championship (O'Sullivan Cup).

As you can see from those results, James brought his enormous experience to great effect at junior level before eventually retiring in 2003 at the grand old age of 42 after a glittering career in the blue and gold. James was coach to numerous underage teams during his playing years, with some great results, and served as a senior selector for three years.

Having served on the executive committee of the club for many years, James was asked to become chairperson of the development committee in 2001 by the then chairperson, Andy O'Sullivan. The job was to oversee the complete redevelopment of the clubhouse with a state of the art, new development to serve all sections of the club for the years ahead. There was general agreement our facilities were completely outdated and other clubs in the parish were offering much better facilities.

James went on to put together a talented, hard working committee who did Trojan work over the next five years securing National Lottery funding, Munster Council grants, capital grants etc. James was meticulous in these applications as I well remember, being development officer with Kerry County Board at the time.

His attention to detail, photographs and back-up material was exemplary. After five years of tremendous work and fundraising, the grand opening took place on 26th March 2006, officially launched by Uachtarán C.L.G. Sean Kelly and John O'Donoghue T.D., Minister for Arts, Sport and Tourism. A truly historic day for the club.

In the opening day programme, James wrote a wonderful article entitled, "From Dream to Reality", full of facts, humour and the usual "hop balls" from the man himself, a wonderful story covering the five years involved. If you have not read it get your hands on it and enjoy a most entertaining read.

James still runs that development committee and the club has since redeveloped our second pitch to a full-blown, sand based pitch with provisions for lighting installed, which will

> come into use later this year. The committee are at present developing the open area alongside the main hall as a state of the art gym with all the necessary facilities. To you James and that dynamic committee many thanks to you all for your excellent vision and attention to detail.

> When the lotto was launched in May 2012, James was again highly involved and staunchly supported its launch. He again saw it as a great source of income for the club and it has been a huge success. James again is a permanent fixture in the Killarney Heights Hotel for the Lotto draw.

> Charity events over the years have been a huge part of James' leisure time and he cycled and walked for numerous charities and fund raising

events over the years. I know some of the people involved in these events and the feedback is to say a huge thank you for all your efforts.

James lives in Ballycasheen with his wife, Carmel, and sons, Paul and Mark. He is currently recovering from serious injuries sustained while climbing Carrauntoohil last July. Being the man he is, a wonderful recovery is in progress following nine months of intensive rehabilitation, a true testament to a great sportsman and administrator.

James, we wish you well in all your future endeavours, a speedy recovery and most of all a heartfelt thanks for your enormous contribution to a club I know you hold dear.

Impressions of a 'blow-in' to SPA

It's almost 40 years ago, but memories of arriving in the Spa area are still fresh in the mind.

Being a "blow-in" can sometimes be difficult. Being in the GAA, however, makes integration into a new community much easier. Irrespective of location, the GAA ethos is the same everywhere and opens doors to lasting friendships. The GAA has that fraternal sense of belonging that makes people feel at home.

I had been involved in my native Gneeveguilla club for several years and already knew many members of the Spa club. I also had relatives in the Spa area and that helped.

In the late 1970's, there was sharp-edged rivalry between the clubs. Gneeveguilla were enjoying their best run ever on the football field – not equalled since then – but they never got anything soft from Spa. Along with Dr Crokes, they were the top three clubs in east Kerry at the time.

Tadhg O'Sullivan was then chairman of Spa and the club's newly-developed playing pitch and dressingrooms were officially opened, in June 1979. I was there for the official opening which was marked by a Kerry v Cork challenge game, enjoyed by a large crowd on a sunny Sunday.

The same month, Gneeveguilla won the O'Donoghue Cup for the first time, defeating Spa in a hard-fought final. A few months later, my wife, Kathleen, and I moved to Tiernaboul and have happily remained there ever since, raising our family there.

At that time, the Castle Heights Hotel (now Killarney Heights) was the venue for a big social gathering each week - games of "31" on Sunday nights. There were several tables of cardplayers and legendary "31" players such as my kinsman, Pats Casey, Patrick Cahill and Mick and Mrs Sugrue, to name just a few, ruled the roost.

Not being in the same card-playing league as the aforementioned, I tended to pass a little time in the bar among Spa people, with Bernie O'Riordan and Marie as hosts. Hailing from Gneeveguilla, I often had to put up with "ribbing" from the likes of John O'Leary, the "Farmer" brothers, Donie and Andrew, the Herlihy brothers, William and Dave, and other rascals. Balls were hopping.

After a few years, I was roped in as secretary of Coiste na nOg, with Denny Doolan as chairman, and later as editor of the club's history, 50 Blian Ag Fas, 1948-1998.

It's been great to see the Spa club grow and prosper with the passing years. The modest "field" has changed beyond recognition and now boasts superb facilities, pitches, a multipurpose sports hall, meeting rooms, dressingrooms and other amenities of which it can be proud.

The redoubtable Tadhg was the first chairman I knew. He was a formidable character, a most influential and dedicated man who demanded, and got, high standards. He set the benchmark and laid down the foundations which so many other worthy officers of the club have continued to build on. For me, a few things stand out in the club.

First, there's a deep-rooted community spirit through which the club has helped establish a distinct identity for the area it serves.

Second, there's that inspiring sense of loyalty and passion of its members of all ages, with some outstanding leaders coming forward over the years.

Third, there's a genuine willingness among the members to work selflessly for the club and support it in every way, be it on the terraces, the stage, the dancefloor, even the golf course, or with tractor or pick and shovel when needs be.

Fourth, the club is about much more than football; there are many other things going on - take its enviable, national record in Scor, as an example.

SPA Welcome

Donie O'Sullivan, Mick Gleeson and Sam Maguire in a Torchlight Procession in 1970

Sunday September 27th, 1970, will live long in the lore of the GAA in Spa, as on that day Donie O'Sullivan climbed the steps of the Hogan Stand to receive the Sam Maguire Cup. His team mate and fellow Spa man, Michael Gleeson, turned in a storming display, finishing with a personal tally of 1-1 to pave the way for a well- deserved back to back victory for the Kingdom, which had also won the title, in 1969, with a side captained by Johnny Culloty, of Killarney Legion.

Kerry GAA records show the last time the Spa area was represented on a county senior team was in the 1930s when the former club chairman, Tadhg O'Sullivan, and his brother, Mick, wore the county colours in the National League. Way back, in 1901 and 1902, Denis and Thado O'Keeffe, from Lissivigeen, were regulars on the senior county side.

Donie O'Sullivan first came to the notice of the county selectors, in 1960. Playing in the county championship with Dr Crokes, he turned in a masterly display and his long kicking became a feature of those games.

After suffering successive defeats by Down, in 1960 and 1961, Kerry were back in the race for Sam, with Donie O'Sullivan figuring at right full back. After turning in another fine performance against Dublin in the semi-final, Kerry reached the 1962 final against Roscommon which they won rather easily. Due to his studies in Maynooth College, Donie was unable to take his place in the final, but was still rewarded with his first Celtic cross.

Following suffering successive defeats to Dublin in the 1963 semi-final, and Galway, in 1964 and 1965, the county underwent a rather lean period until Jackie Lyne took over the management of the side in 1968. After bowing our rather narrowly to Down in that year's final, Kerry were once more back in the final, in 1969, and went on to defeat Offaly.

By now, Donie had copperfastened his place on the senior panel as one of the finest defenders in the country. His kicking of the dead ball became a feature of his play.

After Spa defeated Dr Crokes in the 1969 O'Donoghue Cup final and the all-conquering East Kerry team went on to win the county championship that season, Donie was the automatic choice for the captaincy of the Kerry team, in 1970.

... a verse from a poem by Pat Crowley which appeared in The Kerryman on the Friday after the game.

Mick Gleeson first came to the notice of the county selectors after turning in a fine performance with East Kerry in the 1964 and 1965 county finals and was selected for the opening rounds of the National League, in 1965, against one of the country's finest full backs, Leo Murphy from Down.

When Kerry lost to Down in the 1968 final, Michael was a substitute. By then, he was figuring regularly with UCD in Sigerson Cup competitions and with East Kerry in the county championship, which helped to enhance his career as a county player. When Kerry faced Offaly in the 1969 final, Michael was an automatic choice for right full forward. Kerry won by a three-point margin to claim their 21st title.

After a historic round the world tour, Kerry were back in contention to regain the title, in 1970. In their opening game against Limerick, Mick Gleeson notched 2-1 and Kerry defeated Cork in the Munster final rather easily. After suffering a scare against Derry in the All-Ireland semi-final, during which Johnny Culloty was forced to bring off a fine penalty save from Sean O'Connell and Derry kicked a second penalty wide, Kerry survived to meet Meath in the final, on September 27th 1970.

For the first time, a Spa footballer would lead the team around Croke Park, before an attendance of 71,775. Kerry were dealt a sore blow in the 33rd minute of the game when Donie, who was playing a captain's part, was forced to retire with a muscle injury and replaced by Seamus Mac Gearailt.

Kerry gradually gained the initiative and when Den Joe Crowley, of the Rathmore club, scored a memorable goal, they were on the road to victory and Donie was ready to accept the Sam Maguire on the Hogan Stand.

Donie, Mick and Sam received a royal welcome on arrival at Killarney railway station, on the Monday night. A huge contingent of Spa supporters led the torchlight parade, which received much media acclaim.

For over four decades, the club has continued its expansion policy of investment in the purchase and development of land for playing fields, clubhouse, sportshall and parking facilities.

Virtually all GAA clubs now have at least two playing fields. In more recent times, we have witnessed the development of floodlit facilities for both playing and training purposes as well as the development of all-weather playing areas which can be used nearly the whole year round in any conditions.

And, as players increasingly expect better surfaces, the standards of natural grass pitches are improving through better routine maintenance.

Spa has a fine record in this regard and our progressive outlook, volunteerism and enterprise have left us very well equipped for the years ahead to fulfill the needs of the community and to enable us to reach our full potential.

Huge thanks are due to the foresight of the club's management, the support of the local community, the willingness of the O'Keeffe family to initially rent their land to us and, subsequently, to sell the land which allowed us to develop our own facilities. Indeed, all the club land of about 13 acres was purchased from Denis and Teresa O'Keeffe and family. Denis was our late vice-president

The following is a brief outline of our pitch development activity: In 1974, we completed the purchase of 5.25acres for our main pitch. This ground was ploughed and re-seeded in 1978, 2 drains were installed under the bank on the roadside and drains were also provided under both goal areas.

In 1990, floodlights were installed on the roadside bank. At that time, we were one of the only 2 clubs in the county with training lights.

Back in the 1970's, the preparation for games involved grass cutting with a silage harvester and trailer for collecting. A water ballast land roller, filled with as much water as you could possibly get into it, was used occasionally to level out humps and hollows. Today, the maintenance work carried out on this ground includes regular mowing, sanding, fertilising and vertidraining.

In 1984, we completed the purchase of a further 2.50 acres for a juvenile pitch. Again this pitch was levelled, ploughed and re-seeded. Over the years, we had great difficulty with water lodging on top, as there was no natural drainage. This was due to the fact that the best of the soil was buried with over 4 feet of sub-soil in the leveling process. Repeated efforts to deal with this problem failed.















In 2007, a further 5.25 acres was purchased to give us a second, full-size pitch, additional ground for car parking and training areas. Work commenced in late 2009 to develop and extend the existing juvenile pitch into a full-size senior pitch.

This was completed in 2010 and the pitch was available for use in early 2011.

However, due to severe compaction problems, we had ongoing problems with drainage and poor grass growth and it was decided to upgrade the pitch with drainage and a sand-carpet surface at a cost of about €108,000.

Following receipt of a Sports Capital Grant of €80,000, work commenced in 2015 with deep ploughing, grading, installations of drains, spreading of 3 inches of sand before fertilising and seeding in August 2016. It is planned to have this pitch ready for use, weather permitting, in April.

Regular maintenance, including sanding, verti-draining and fertilising, is important to maintaining good playing surfaces. This can cost us in the region of €12,000 annually. Regular mowing is also essential.

We are also very fortunate to be able to avail of the services of both the Community Employment and Rural Social Schemes which allows us to maintain the grounds to the highest standards. This also reduces considerably both the volunteer and financial burden on the club.

The maintenance of sand carpet pitches will require sand being continually applied to prevent earthworm activity reducing infiltration rates of the sand. Although these types of pitches have proven to perform well in winter, there could be hardness issues which could cause drainage problems in very dry weather.

Sand carpet pitches are also high maintenance in terms of nutrients and water and need intensive aeration and sanding programmes to prevent a "capping" layer from building up on the surface.

Further works will involve completing the work on the underage/ training pitch, ball-stop netting, floodlighting, dugouts, pitch fencing, safety improvements to spectator areas, carpark surfacing, completion of the perimeter track, landscaping of the roadside bank – all being subject to the availability of the necessary funding.
